WHEN THE WHALE-MEN WERE NOT ENGAGED IN HUNTING WHALES OR ROUTINE MAINTENANCE THEIR SPARE TIME WAS SPENT CARVING MATERIALS HARVESTED FROM THE WHALES AND NOT NEEDED COMMERCIALLY. AT THE END OF A LONG, OFTEN TWO TO THREE YEAR VOYAGE, THE RESULTING CAREFULLY CRAFTED OBJECTS WOULD PROVIDE TREASURED SOUVENIRS FOR LOVED ONES AT HOME, OR MEMENTOES FOR USE ON BOARD.

SEAM RUBBERS WERE A SAILMAKER'S TOOL, HAND-MADE IN ONE PIECE, FOR WORKING AND SMOOTHING THE CLOTH OF SAILS, TARPAULINS, CANOPIES AND HAMMOCKS ON BOARD SHIP. THRIFTY CAPTAINS WHO DID NOT WANT THE COST OF NEW SAILS TAKEN OUT OF THEIR SHARE OR 'LAY' INSISTED ON PATCHING WORN OUT OR TORN CANVAS SAILS. SEAM RUBBERS WERE ALSO USED FOR DUNGAREES, JACKETS, SLICKERS AND OTHER SAILOR-MADE AND SAILOR-REPAIRED GARMENTS.
